

### Greetings, UCC colleagues and friends:

Trinn and I recently watched a new documentary on the life of Temple Grandin. The film, titled "An Open Door," tells the story of Grandin's personal journey with autism and her lifelong commitment to the humane treatment of animals. In explaining how she imagined revolutionary new ways of structuring cattle stockyards to reduce animal stress and cruelty, Grandin said: "I see in pictures." This insight led to her legendary influence in expanding our understanding of neurodiversity.

Toward the end of the documentary, Grandin is asked why, at age 75, she keeps up such a frenetic pace – writing, lecturing, traveling, signing books. Her answer was pure and sweet: "I'm happy when I'm solving problems. I'm happy when I'm watching my students succeed. I'm happy when I see my lifelong work have positive effects on the world."

This story of a kind, humble hero stands in stark contrast to the cruelties of our time. These days we regularly witness the dismantling of decency as people are shut out, civil rights are clawed back, humanitarian aid is canceled, and genocide is ignored. Power is wielded in such a way that retaliation and mean-spiritedness now pervade the political landscape.

When will our better angels rise up? When will the collective goodness of humanity say, "Enough already"? This is not who we are as people of faith, and this is not who we are as a democracy committed to opportunity, liberty, and justice for all.

But even though it is easy to feel helpless these days, you and I can make a difference.

First, we can bear witness to the Gospel of love in little ways every day, remembering that kindness can be contagious. Some years ago, Trinn saw Temple Grandin in an airport surrounded by a small crowd. Instead of rushing off, Grandin patiently greeted every curious bystander, encouraging them to inspire others. "I just do unto others as I would want them to do unto me," she says in the documentary. Kindness matters.

Second, we can muster the courage to step over some invisible boundaries. For Grandin, that meant venturing into cattle yards and daring to tell men in cowboy boots and hats that she knew a better way to organize a stockyard. Despite their inevitable resistance, she convinced one after another that reducing animal cruelty would bring positive changes to the cattle industry. The lesson for us? Talk with a stranger. Intentionally get to know people of color. Engage in random acts of kindness. Be ridiculously generous. Do what Jesus would do – cross boundaries for the good of humanity.

Third, we can hope. If "faith is the assurance of things hoped for and the conviction of things not yet seen" (Hebrews 11:1), then God invites us to imagine a world where goodness and compassion, justice and mercy bring lasting shalom. Perhaps "seeing in pictures" can be a spiritual practice that allows us to envision a way forward even as it feels that the norms we have known are crumbling around us.

Finally, we can keep sharing our values the way Temple Grandin does – with passion and conviction. I'm often tempted to rant against people who see the world differently than I do, but the truth is I find it way more effective to tell them what I believe: I believe in neighborly love, full inclusion, grace that fosters forgiveness, relief for the poor and healing for the broken, justice and generosity for all.

In the covenant of our common Conference life, we are seeing open doors and discovering some new ways forward. Over the coming program year, we intend to provide more opportunities for cultivating relationships among us and for sharing ministry resources. Networking builds friendships and enables the exchange of ideas that lead to congregational vitality. In two weeks, the Conference Board and staff will meet in retreat to formulate a strategy for turning these priorities into reality.

- Wisconsin Conference Life will be published on the third Wednesday of each month and will focus on innovative ministry initiatives and the people behind them.






